Sahaya International overview of activities

READ (Rural Education & Action Development)- Tamil Nadu, India



READ is a Non-Governmental Organization (NGO), active in rural areas of Tamil Nadu (India). READ has been our primary partner since the inception of Sahaya International. For a more detailed description of the many activities of READ, including

General support of READ's programs

Through its general fundraising activities (including the sale of embroidered cards and solicitation of contributions), Sahaya International continues to provide general assistance (salaries, supplies, etc.) to many of READ's programs, including:

- Two kindergarten/elementary schools: the Mother Teresa School in Periyakrishnapuram (171 students, from lower kindergarten to Vth standard) and the Jawahar Matriculation school in Andimadam (185 students, from lower kindergarten to VIth standard). Both schools were constructed with funds raised by Sahaya International and Sahaya.eu.
- Two schools for mentally disabled children: in Perambalur (26 children) and Andimadam (25 children).
- Skill-training programs for youth and disabled people (including card-making, sewing, type-writing, computer training, book-binding) that take place at the READ Community Resource Center.
- Women and men self-help groups that READ has previously organized. Currently 861 groups are active. READ assists them via a micro-finance program withs loans for income-generating activities.

• General support to READ's Community Resource Center (RCRC) for rural disabled people.

READ and Sahaya had previously applied with success to the Japanese Embassy, Chennai for grant support to construct a Resource Center in Andimadam to educate, train and rehabilitate disabled people. Construction was completed in 2008, and the building was inaugurated in March 2010. In addition to housing one of the schools for mentally disabled children and the vocational skilltraining programs, the RCRC also has a mini-health center (with physical rehabilitation equipment) and counseling & career guidance facilities.

Child sponsorship program

Sahaya International and READ have an orphan sponsorship program. For a monthly contribution of \$30, the children receive basic necessities such as nutrition, clothing, and school expenses. Some sponsors make extra contributions to cover the expenses of higher education. During this fiscal year, the number of sponsored children increased to 185. The sponsors receive regular letters and photographs. On December 17, a field trip to Silver Beach in Cuddalore was organized.



Ranjitha, Manjula and Selvarani are 3 bright students from poor families. Thanks to our sponsorship program they are currently in college.

Hope Walks Davis

Since 2007, Sahaya International has collaborated with Global Strategies for HIV Prevention to organize an annual Hope Walks Davis event. The proceeds of this event are sent to READ to cover extra medical, travel and nutritional expenses for 15 HIV-infected children in READ's programs and provide general assistance to 8 uninfected children who were in dire needs. Ongoing fundraising for construction work at Mother Teresa School (Periyakrishnapuram)

Thanks to Sahaya's previous fundraising activities, a one-story school building with 4 class-rooms was completed in the summer of 2008. Now in 2010, the Mother Teresa School has 171 children from underprivileged families. The classes range from kindergarten through 5th standard.

Accordingly, a 2nd level with 4 extra classrooms is urgently needed.

In addition, the moat at the entrance of the school becomes flooded severely during the rainy season. Accordingly, construction of a bridge is very much needed.

During 2010, nearly \$17,000 was raised for these projects (of the estimated \sim \$55,000 that is needed). See page 11 to learn more about the different fundraisers that were organized by Sahaya volunteers.

School furniture

With the funds raised by Sahaya International and Sahaya.eu, local carpenters completed making wooden desks and benches for both the Mother Teresa School and the Jawahar Matriculation School. The students, who previously had to sit on the concrete floor, benefit from a more comfortable learning environment.

HIV/AIDS care and support services

READ had previously started a HIV-positive network named "Malarum Mottukal" (meaning "blossoming flower") to assist persons living with HIV/AIDS (PLHIV). The network meets monthly and provides counseling, medical assistance and referrals. Currently 101 PLHIV have joined the network. Most of them arrive in very destitute situations. Approximately 80-90% of the members are usually able to attend the monthly meetings. During the previous years, the activities of this network were largely supported by consecutive grants of Gilead Sciences, Inc.

Thanks to continued grant support from Gilead Sciences, Inc., a number of activities have been implemented during 2010:

- Election of leaders:

Because some of the previous leaders had left the network, the network meeting of July 15, 2010 was used to elect new leaders.

- Support services to PLHIV:

Network members were given financial support to cover their monthly travel expenses (to pick up medications) and some food expenses on those travel days. This has had a major impact. While in 2008 only 23 were receiving anti-HIV drugs (antiretrovirals; ARV), this number has increased to 75 members, with nearly all of them reporting clear improvement of their health. Travel time to the Government ARV centers is 2-6 hours one-way.

- Gilead Health & Counseling Center

The Gilead Health & Counseling Center was

The Mother Teresa Standard English School of Periyakrishnapuram village currently provides basic education to 171 children from underprivileged families. During 2010, the classrooms were provided with desks and benches. Our plans for the next few years include continued fundraising for construction of a 2nd level to accommodate the many students, and construction of a bridge at the entrance, where the moat turns into a torrential river after heavy monsoon rains.



started in the past year. It is located in the READ Community Resource Center. Every month the health nurse checks the height and weight of the PLHIV network members, sometimes checks their blood pressure and provides health advice. The health nurse and the network members have been given training on home-based care. At the monthly meeting, some members received first-aid depending on their health conditions; some members who have wounds or injuries are given new dressings. The health center also distributes condoms, and the health nurse gives condom demonstrations.

In the counseling center, the members are given individual and family counseling, conflict resolution, legal advice and aid depending upon their family circumstances. Approximately 25-30 PLHIV members have been making use of this counseling center on a regular basis. In addition, the part-time counselor also visits PLHIV at their home to provide counseling and assist with conflict resolution.

- Training on micro-loan & micro-enterprise:

On January 25, 2010, Ms. P. Jothimani, project officer of READ, gave training to 14 members of the PLHIV network about the process of utilizing the loan to start a small enterprise and improve their living conditions. Some members received a loan, while other members have applied for a loan.

SEE Trust

SEE Trust (Socio-economic Education and Empowerment Trust) is an registered, nongovernmental organization committed to the welfare of downtrodden and marginalized women and children in Cuddalore, India. It was started by in 2007 by 3 sisters (Sr. Daisy, Sr. Vincent Mary and Sr. Jesu Mary) to assist and empower underprivileged people. They collaborate closely with READ. They have organized 10 children's parliaments in different villages, in which approximately 300 children and youth participate. They also offer evening tuition centers that are benefiting 72 students. To empower women, they organize self-help groups, assist them with micro-financing, and provide skill-training to women and other women empowerment programs. Prerana Women's Health Initiative and Public Health Research Institute (Mysore, India)

The Prerana Women's Health Initiative and Public Health Research Institute are based on the belief that women have a right to voluntary, comprehensive, and culturally sensitive services for family planning, reproductive health and HIV. "Prerana" means "inspiration" in Kannada, the local language of Karnataka. The project team hope to inspire women to advocate for improved reproductive health.

The project is designed to integrate antenatel care and HIV testing & counseling in 144 rural Mysore villages, and to give pregnant women in hard-to-reach regions access to a full package of comprehensive antenatal care from skilled healthcare providers.

The project has been providing outreach, education and free reproductive health care services to more than 2500 women during 2010. Some highlights include:



SEE Trust organizes Children's Parliaments and gets them involved in community work.



The programs of Prerana Women's Health Initiative and Public Health Research Institute (Mysore, India)

- Training of 77 ANM's (auxiliary nurse-midwife), 126 accredited Social Health Advocates for the government, serving a population of over 250,000 in preventing vertical transmission of HIV.
- Training of 423 Community Health Workers (CHW) in rural areas of Mysore in safe birthing practices and prevention of mother-to-child transmission.
- Implementation of 141 education and awareness programs across rural Mysore Taluk, attended by a total of 5,161 community members (4,212 women and 899 men).
- 92 mobile medical camps serving 144 villages, providing antenatal care to 1,675 pregnant women, and confidential counseling & testing to 1,639 women. For more information, please visit www. sahaya.org/prerana.

Lamling Vista (Nagaland, India)

A new project since 2009 is the Lamling Vista elementary school in Yongam, Nagaland. This village has a population of approximately 1500 people, consisting of 180 families. There are no proper roads and communication systems with the nearest small city of Lenglong, 12 km away. Because no facility was available to educate young children, a small school was started to provide kindergarten and elementary education.

The school has currently 150 students and 8 teachers, and goes to 6th standard. The funds that have been raised via Sahaya International in 2010 are also used to construct a new school with more rooms (7 classrooms and 1 office) and better infrastructure. Construction is expected to be completed in 2011.

HIV Awareness of the Deaf (Kenya)

This program, which is led in Kenya by our program coordinator Jacquilyn Odwesso, was originally funded by a 2004 grant from the Development Marketplace program of the World Bank. In collaboration with GRACE (Grassroots Alliance for Community Education; www.graceusa. org), this program developed a peer education curriculum with Kenyan sign language vocabulary, and created a Peer Education Network to teach deaf youth and adults about sexual health & hygiene, puberty, relationships, and HIV/AIDS. In 2007, we published and distributed "The Deaf Peer's Education Manual - A training manual developed by the Kenyan Peer Education Network, with interactive-based activities for basic understanding of sexual health, HIV and AIDS" (to download, visit www.sahaya.org/deaf/index.html.

In 2008, Jacquilyn had registered a new NGO, namely "Sahaya Deaf, Kenya" to bring more attention to deaf people and their issues in Kenya and other developing countries. Sahaya Deaf, Kenya has also been able to directly secure grant support from the Elton John AIDS Foundation (U.K) to work with Deaf women groups. In addition, the partnership of Sahaya-Deaf, Kenya with GRACE has received USAID-PEPFAR funding to extend the programs with deaf youth.

In 2010, thanks to continued grant support from Gilead Sciences via Sahaya International, a 2nd edition of this manual is being developed and expected to be ready at the end of 2011.



To take Sahaya International to the next level, reach a larger audience and widen our ripple effect of "making a difference," a cutting-edge promotional video that would highlight our activities would be extremely useful. Because making a high-quality promotional video is expensive, Sahaya International started a collaboration with ReelAid (www.reelaid.org), a Hollywood- based organization started by movie actor/director Andy Lauer. Reel-Aid consists of people who work in the film industry and who use their available resources and expertise to help make promotional videos, 10 to 15 minutes long, for small non-profit organizations - such as Sahaya - at a much reduced cost.

From December 11 through 23, 2010, Andy Lauer and Director of Photography Josh Gibson spent time in India to take the video footage, which included interviewing several families. After months are spent on editing and production, the video is expected to be completed in the 2nd half of 2011. For more information, visit www. sahaya.org/video.html.





The Jawahar Matriculation School of Andimadam, of which construction was completed in 2009, provides currently basic education to 184 students, ranging from kindergarten to 6th Standard. Achievements in 2010 include the delivery of desks and benches to all classrooms, and the construction of a wash basin. Ongoing fundraising activities are focused on improving the infrastructure of the school.





VASANTHI - nursing student

Vasanthi grew up in Vilandai, Andimadam, in a poor family. She was a very good student in high school, and dreamt of becoming a nurse. Because her family was not able to support higher studies, Sahaya board member Elisabeth Sherwin organized two "**Tea for Vasanthi**" fundraisers in 2007 and 2008, and a yard sale in 2010. Vasanthi has been passing all her exams. In August 2010, she completed her 4 year of studies at the Chidambaram College of Nursing in Chennai. Recently she obtained her official diploma. She wrote in a letter:

My heartfelt thanks to Elisabeth and all of you. Thank you for all your guidance and support. I will always be very grateful to you.



Although Sahaya International was only registered in the USA, we had been receiving growing support from volunteers and sponsors in Europe, particularly with the orphan sponsorship program and the school programs at READ. In 2010, we continued to build on these collaborations:

- Netherlands:

Sahaya International (USA) was recognized in 2009 by the government of the Netherlands as ANBI (Algemeen nut beogende instelling). Donations to Sahaya International from donors in the Netherlands are now tax-deductible. Nearly \leq 1,000 was raised in 2010.

- Belgium:

In July 2009, a core team of volunteers in Belgium registered the non-profit organization Sahaya International.eu (abbreviated: "Sahaya.eu"). While Sahaya.eu is fiscally independent from Sahaya International (USA), we share goals and causes. In 2010, a total of \in 6,617 was raised. For more information, please visit www.sahaya.eu.

Nada Brahma Music Ensemble

On Saturday March 13, the Davis-based Nada Brahma Music Ensemble gave a performance at International House Davis, and treated the audience to the mystical sounds of ancient music from India. A total of \$716 was raised towards the construction of a 2nd level on the Mother Teresa School of READ.



Birthday party fundraiser

Board member Paulina Zielinska organized a birthday party on May 22. Her birthday wish to her friends was to make a donation to Sahaya for the Mother Teresa School. \$1,088 was raised.



Yoga for Sahaya

During July and August, Saroja Subrahmanyan gave several classes of Integral Yoga at the Fiesta Dance 'N Fitness studio in Davis, and donated all proceeds (\$108) to READ's programs for disabled people.

Yard sale for Vasanthi

On Saturday August 7, Sahaya board member Elisabeth Sherwin organized a yard sale of items that were donated by her circle of friends, and she forwarded all the proceeds (\$532) to Sahaya to support the nursing studies of Vasanthi.

Charity Work Day

The concept of Charity Work Day is that on that day, participants will go to their regular work but will voluntarily donate a certain amount (partial or full) of their daily salary to a charity like Sahaya.

Chung Truong organized the first Sahaya Charity Work Days on December 10, 2011 and January 28, 2011, and raised \$1,660 for the Mother Teresa school of Periyakrishnapuram.

Hope Walks Davis - 2010

Hope Walks (www.hopewalks.org) is an initiative by Global Strategies for HIV Prevention (San Rafael, California). It is an educational and fun(d)-raising walk that provides an opportunity for children, along with family members and friends to make a difference in the lives of orphans and vulnerable children by providing health-care, education, shelter and food.

In close partnership with the First Baptist Church, International House Davis, St. James Parish, University Covenant Church, the Cal Aggie Christian Association (CA-House) and several Davis High School Clubs (including Freedom from Hunger and Key Club), we organized on Sunday October 17, 2010 the fourth Hope Walks Davis event in Arroyo Park (www.hopewalks.org/ davis). The event educated many adults and children and and raised \$5,917 to provide for the basic needs of orphans and vulnerable children in READ's rural area in India - food, clothing, school fees, uniforms, and access to HIV testing, treatment and care.

On March 27, 2010, the Belgian Club of Northern California (www.bcnc.com) organized a fundraiser food/ drink/music event in Hayward to benefit 3 charities. \$1,804 was raised for Sahaya's school programs.



Sahaya International Student Club at UCD

Since 2008, there is a registered Sahaya International student club at the University of California, Davis (UCD), founded by Anisha Illa. During the school year 2009-2010, Arin Kulshi took over the leadership of this club.

The students meet regularly on campus and organize fundraising events on the UCD campus and in the Davis area. Examples include selling Valentine Day cards, and tabling at Picnic Day 2010 and Whole Earth Festival to raise funds by selling cards and bracelets.

On May 27, 2010, they also organized a free showing of the movie "Beyond borders" (with Angelina Jolie and Clive Owen) on the UCD campus to raise awareness and inspire students to make a difference.
